- * NANCY SPERO: Spero's tough and gentle hand-stamped work celebrates eons of female strength in three locations at once, with her trademark mix of defiance, stasis, and discordant grace. In the back room, the platform full of small white figurines Yuskavage made in the process of actualizing these imaginary figures (they're staged, sketched, photographed) is even badder. - LUCAS SAMARAS: This festive retrospective of meticulous work in many media includes his prepunk pieces with razor blades, his alarmingly encrusted boxes and chairs, and walls that drip multicolored yarn. The compartmented installation turns the gallery itself into a giant Samaras box, containing an emperor's ransom of bejeweled objects, seductive surfaces, and threatening images.
