ART ATTACK

Painted Ladies: New York artist Lisa Yuskavage's extreme women will winter at the ICA. ere's a sure bet: for sheer art-show attendance figures, nothing will beat Van Gogh this fall. "Van Gogh: Face to Face," a choice selection of the artist's portraits culled from three American museums, will make its last stop at the Philadelphia Museum of Art (October 22nd-January 14th). If this is on your must-see list, that's fine. But there's lots more art to view before 2000 ends, in and

around Philadelphia, vintage and new—some of it as provocative as Van Gogh's was in his time.

To help put the Dutch master's work in perspective, there's "About Face: American Art at the Time of Van Gogh," at the Pennsylvania academy of the Fine Arts, showcasing works from the Academy's collection (October 21st-January 14th). For another view of the 19thcentury painting milieu that the angst-ridden artist struggled against, take in the Delaware Art Museum's exhibition of 50 Victorian narrative paintings from the Forbes Magazine collection in London (September 9th-January 7th). Don't forget the Art Museum's other worthwhile shows, running alongside Vincent. For instance, acclaimed photographer Ray K. Metzker, known for his urban scenes, shows another side of his work—13 years' worth of landscape photographs, of subjects from Tuscany to Utah (November 18th-February 11th).

You don't have to schlep to New York to get a taste of what's hot in that capital of the art world. Featured in last spring's Whitney Biennial, Lisa Yuskavage has her first solo museum show at the Institute of Contemporary Art (December 2nd-February 4th). Her lush, naughty paintings of baby-faced females with proportions distended past Barbie dimensions make us question our ideas of femininity and beauty. Beverly Semmes has received national (and international) attention for her monumental fabric works examining the interplay of clothing and identity. At the Fabric Workshop and Museum, you can see a new installation work she's created in residency there, featuring a large sculptural installation of fluorescent-yellow fabric along with photos, video and costumes (September 14th-November 4th). Right after that, the Fabric Workshop attacks these same issues more whimsically, with the fashion photographs of William Wegman-featuring his elegant, sober-faced weimaraners in duds from Gucci to Gaultier (November 16th-January 13th).

Three-dimensional art will make a strong showing this fall, too, when a (continued on page 190)





number of Philadelphia-based artists with proven chops display new work. Sculptors Nicholas Kripal and Kevin Kautenberger show pieces that share a contemplative bent at the Philadelphia Art Alliance (September 9th-November 1st). Kripal's chunky concrete sculptures reflect the interior spaces of a Renaissance church; Kautenberger's window installations explore the translucent beauty of bee pollen and amber. For a real art adventure, visit the Eastern State Penitentiary, where Kripal has constructed a pool and garden modeled on the former prison's historic architectural plan (through November 5th). On a sunny day at Eastern State, you can catch the effects of Richard Torchia's camera-obscura piece, "Daylights" (also through the 5th).

Mei-Ling Hom's sculptural installations never fail to provoke thought and feeling. In December, she shows a kinetic multi-sensory piece at the Institute of Contemporary Art that incorporates wiggling six-foot-long "silkworms" and Chinese herbs and spices (December 2nd-February 4th). Alan Greenberg, another consistently interesting sculptor, takes over Gallery Joe's tiny Bird Park, just around the corner from the gallery at 3rd below Arch (through November 30th). John Phillips and Carolyn Healy, a sound-and-sculpture team, do their third Fringe Festival installation, this year at Larry Becker Contemporary Art (through September 16th).

In spite of recent pronouncements from the art establishment, painting is also alive and well. Genre giant Frank Stella shows at Locks with new wall-reliefs and a site-specific piece playing off the gallery's massive columns (October 13th-November 25th). Robert Straight, whose paintings feel like mysterious cosmic diagrams, exhibits works on paper at Schmidt/Dean's Spruce Street space (September 8th-October 14th). Randall Exon knows how to paint landscapes, and he shows his stuff at More Gallery (November 10th through January 6th).

In the not-to-miss category is Judith Schaechter's stained-glass art, opening the season at Snyderman Gallery (September 1st-3oth). Her beautifully crafted but intensely personal images are in a class by themselves. An ambitious triptych has already been sold, but other works have never been seen. And in
