

The Figure As Fiction: The Figure in Visual Art and Literature

Curated by Center Director Elaine A. King, The Figure as Fiction is a visual and literal exploration of artists' and authors' portrayals of the figure at the close of the 20th century. The exhibition includes painting, sculpture, video, photography and computer-generated art, as well as books and passages from a range of literature spanning 150 years, from Gustave Flaubert to Susan Sontag. Together, these works demonstrate that the visual artist, in a manner closely akin to the writer of fiction, tends to depict the figure in an abstract way.
